Students will work together in small groups to practice proper light metering and camera techniques to shoot a roll of film while considering MOVEMENT, POINT OF VIEW, FOCUS, and PORTRAIT. **Each group member** will select a **different** image

which represents the best of the roll. Each group member will then use their selected image to make a test strip and a 5" x 7" print, which will be turned in with an individual rubric.
